

There are certain prescribed medications that are categorized as controlled substances. Those along with some over the counter medications have a high potential for abuse and addiction. Unlike non-controlled medications controlled substances cannot be dropped at the pharmacy when they are no longer needed or expired. Flushing controlled



substances and other medications can cause water contamination and other environmental hazards making flushing an unsafe method of disposal. In order to address the need for safe permanent disposal C.A.S.S. Community Coalition in collaboration with Dowagiac PD, Edwardsburg/Ontwa PD, Pokagon Tribal Police, and Silver Creek PD has provided five Red Med Box locations in Cass County.

The purchase of the boxes was made possible through funding from Southwest Michigan Behavioral Health (SWMBH). Red Med Box allows for safe disposal of unwanted, unused and/or expired prescription and over-the-counter (OTC) medications. Using Red Med Box collection sites help to protect our environment. It also helps to combat prescription drug abuse, addiction and accidental or intentional overdose.

# **Prescription and Over the Counter Drug Safety**

The theft and abuse of scheduled prescription and some over-the-counter (OTC) medicines is a serious problem. You play a big role in keeping these powerful medicines out of the hands of those who shouldn't have them.



#### **Secure and Monitor Your Meds**

- ◆ Keep your prescription drugs in a locked or secure place
- Organize and Monitor your medicine cabinet and keep track of how many pills are in each or your prescription bottles.
- If your children take prescription drugs, keep control of the bottles. Talk to your school nurse about monitoring and giving your teen their medication during the school day.
- Be sure older adults understand the importance of securing and monitoring their medications.



# **Safety and Prevention**

- Never share your prescription medications with anyone. It is both illegal and dangerous.
- Educate your children about the dangers of abusing prescription and OTC drugs.
- Monitor children's texting, social media and internet use. Most adolescents use these means to communicate, sadly this includes talking about and planning drug use.
- Use your influence. Parents are the most influential person in a child's life.
   Talk to them about the dangers and risk of all drug and alcohol use.



## Disposal Do's and Don'ts

- **Don't** keep unneeded medications in your home.
- Don't flush medications down the drain or toilet, unless specifically directed to by the manufacturer. They may enter the water table and cause environmental problems.
- Do safely dispose of unused medications.
  - The best way to dispose of your unused medications is at a local collection site. Cass County locations are listed in this brochure.
  - If a disposal site is unavailable mix unused medications into a unpleasant substance such as coffee grounds or cat litter.
     Seal contents in a zip lock bag and dispose in the trash on trash day.
